## Dress Code

## REMINDER: SRA has a dress code. Please make sure your child is in compliance.

## A few basics:

- All students should wear a polo shirt, no button-up shirts. Colors for tops are navy, burgundy, white, hunter green (no black).
- Belts are required for all students grades 1-8.
- Girls' jumpers and skirts can be khaki, navy, black, or French Toast burgundy plaid (but not solid burgundy or green). Hem no more than $3^{\prime \prime}$ above the knee. No dresses.
- Pants should not have elastic waist or hems.
- No light up shoes, no crocs.
- Socks must be solid, in the following colors only: navy, white, black, burgundy, forest green, khaki, or gray.
- Hair accessories should be small and conservative.
- Uniforms must be modest, clean, and orderly (no rips/tears, or heavy stains).
- No visible tattoos (game-day temp tattoos should be removed before returning to school).

$\diamond$ ATTENDANCE: please make sure you notify the office each time your student is absent. You may phone in, 307-745-9930, or email Mrs. Hubenthal at chubenthal@acsd1.org. For pre-arranged absences, please submit this form found on our website.
$\diamond \quad$ CHECK-IN MADE EASY WITH KEY FOBS: We issue bar-code key fobs for parents who frequently visit school. This makes your computer check in/out fast and easy. Please fill out this form to request a fob. Key fobs are name-specific and are assigned to you for the duration of your child being enrolled at SRA, so please hang onto them! Kindly notify the office if your fob is lost or damaged. Thank you.
$\diamond$ MESSAGES TO STUDENTS: Parents requesting messages to be sent to their student (ex: change of plans for parent pick-up or riding bus), must notify the office no later than 2:45 pm. Beyond that time, we cannot guarantee your child will receive the message. Thank you for your understanding.
$\diamond$ LOST AND FOUND: Our lost and found is full! Please find a time to look through and claim any items belonging to your child(ren).

## Winter Weather Gear



- It's that time of year. Temperatures are dropping!
- PLEASE make sure your child has appropriate outdoor gear for recess EVERY DAY (coat, hat, gloves, scarf, snow pants, snow boots, etc.) Our west-facing playground can get very chilly.
NOTE- SRA has a very limited supply of winter gear to loan out to students.
Students may leave a set of snowpants and boots at school during the week. We ask that they be in a reusable bag to hang on their hook- no items should be left on the floor. All items will go home each Friday. Students must have a pair of indoor shoes to change into-
 they may not wear snowboots all day.


## Student Council

## Jeans day will be on November 17th

Periodically, the school will hold Jeans Day. Students who choose to pay $\$ 1.00$ will be allowed to wear denim jeans with their uniform top. Denim jeans will only be allowed on designated Jeans Days. If denim jeans are worn any other time, a uniform citation will be issued, and parents will be called to bring uniform pants. The money raised on Jeans Day will go to the Student Council for projects in the school.
Guidelines for jeans worn on Jeans Day are as follow:
-No words or logos on the jeans (besides Brand logo)
-SMALL amounts of embroidery and bling will be allowed as long as it is a school appropriate design such as flowers or butterflies. (Not allowed: words or skull and crossbones, excessive bling.)
-Must wear regular school belt (with the exception of Kindergarten)
-No rips or holes
-No key chains
-No baggy or excessively wide-legged jeans
-Denim must be blue or black in color (no pink or purple jeans)

-No denim jeggings, or skirts are allowed
-Shirts need to be tucked in and jeans need to be clean.
*Students who forget their money will be given a chance to call home for money or uniform pants. Students who do not follow the Jeans Day guideline will be asked to call home for an appropriate school uniform. If the problem cannot be fixed, a uniform citation will be issued. Students will pay for the jeans in their classroom.
